■ GET TO KNOW YOUR NEIGHBOR

Recently, the Activity Director had the monthly birthday party planned, but she was sick that day, so I volunteered to do it, after rearranging my hair schedule. ■ BOX TOPS FOR EDUCATION

A wonderful project our residents took on was working with elementary-school-aged children and their mothers from our community for a special school project, Box Tops for Education (www.boxtops4education.com). The residents cut thousands of box tops (from General Mills and many other household products; go to the Box Tops for Education web site for participating products) saved by the children and their mothers. Each box top is worth 10¢ for schools to purchase supplies, books, etc. The children took the labels to school, and they were delivered to our facility. The residents trimmed the box tops and put 50 of them in each sandwich bag. This was an ongoing project this past year. The residents could participate by either cutting or counting. It was a great project on weekends or when someone was bored. A total of 18,600 box tops were cut.

The biggest reward came when we learned that the cash value of the box tops for the school was \$1,800. The elementary school principal came to the facility to personally thank the residents who participated. For the residents, it is a great way to make a difference in the classrooms of our community's school children. We are already sharpening our scissors and looking forward to cutting more for Box Tops for Education for the next school year.

■ PING-PONG POKER

Ping-pong Poker is a game that is good for different functioning levels to play together as it combines skill with luck. Players can either keep their cards concealed or let everyone see what they have in their hands.

Materials: Masking tape, 20" - 22" diameter bucket, 2 decks of playing cards (depending on the number of players, make sure you have enough cards for two rounds of play), four ping-pong balls

Game Prep: Place a strip of masking tape on the floor for the shooting line and put the bucket about 12 feet away.

Game Play: Each game consists of two turns for each player. Each participant takes a turn going up to the shooting line and tries to toss four ping-pong balls into the bucket. For every successful shot, he receives a playing card. At the end of two rounds, the player with the best poker hand is the winner. Give the winner a quarter or other small prize. After declaring the winner, collect the cards, shuffle them, and start the next game.

Rules: Poker hands cannot be made up of more than five cards (for example, if a player has won seven cards, he can make his best hand with five cards). A player with ♣

only two or three cards could still be the winner if he is lucky enough to get a pair or three of a kind.

Ranking of Hands: ○ Royal Flush (10 through ace, all one suit) ○ Straight flush (five in a row, all one suit) ○ Four of a kind ○ Full house (pair and three of a kind) ○ Flush (five cards the same suit) ○ Straight (five in a row, mixed suits) ○ Three of a kind ○ Two pair ○ One pair

■ MEATLOAF BAKE-OFF

We are a small adult day center, and it's great when you have a program that everyone enjoys and participates in, no matter what their limitations may be. We started a Gourmet Club that stimulates all the senses. During one of our discussions, one of the clients asked how other people made meatloaf. It was interesting to hear about the variety of ingredients they used. This is where the idea of having a Meatloaf Bake-off came from.

First we assigned teams, mostly based on their preferred main ingredients. Staff made sure that all the ingredients that were requested were available the day of the Bake-off. Some of those items were ketchup, bacon, cheddar cheese, mozzarella cheese, oats, barley, spaghetti sauce, bread crumbs, pieces of bread, onions, peppers, and hot sauce.

On the day of the Meatloaf Bake-off, people put on their chef hats (made the day before) and had fun creating their meatloaf masterpieces. The conversation was wonderful, the aromas were amazing, and the end results were delicious. Everyone won a ribbon.

■ WELCOME JEOPARDY

Welcome Jeopardy was created initially as part of the celebration to welcome a new staff member to our group of participants. It soon became clear that it could also be used with a new admission to the Center. We also adapted it to become Good Luck Jeopardy to use with staff or participants leaving the Center. Both variations are below.

GOOD LUCK JEOPARDY

To wish good luck to a staff member or participant who is leaving, change the first and second categories to **Good Luck** and **From**, and use the other three categories **Annandale**, **Center**, and **Staff or Participant Name**.

AROUND THE WORLD GAME

Around the World Game tests people's knowledge about all seven continents. The questions for the continents were adapted from web sites (listed next to each continent). We played this game on East Meets West Day.

Objectives: To get the playing piece from the starting point to the ending point with all seven Continental Collectables Cards by correctly answering questions along the way.

Number of Participants: 2 - 6 people or teams with equal numbers of people

Materials: Game board, vehicle playing pieces (i.e., cars, planes, train cars), 1 die, duplicates of Continental Collectables (see list in the second column), printouts of additional questions from web sites and other sources

Game Board: On a large piece of cardboard, draw the shapes of the seven continents and color or paint them the colors listed below. Color or paint the rest of the area on the board blue (for water). At one corner of the board, draw an igloo. This will be the starting and ending point of the game. For the spaces on the game board, add seven or eight squares of corresponding colors for each of the continents and one circular colored spot for each of the seven continents. Mix the colored squares and circular spots

around the board starting and ending on the igloo.

Colors: South America - Red, North America - Blue, Europe - Yellow, Asia - Brown, Africa - Green, Australia - Purple, Antarctica - White

Continental Collectables Cards (pictures and names of sites written on cards): South America - Machu Picchu, North America - Statue of Liberty, Europe - Eiffel Tower, Asia - Chinese monastery, Africa - Pyramids, Australia - Sydney Opera House, Antarctica - Polar bear

Game Play:

✓ Players start and end on the igloo, but may move in either direction on the path.

✓ Each player rolls the die and then moves his playing piece the number of spaces specified by the die.

✓ The player answers a question that corresponds to the color block of the continent he has landed on. If he answers correctly, he rolls the die and move his playing piece accordingly. If he answers incorrectly, he gets another question. If he does not answer this question correctly, he waits for his next turn to get another roll of the die.

✓ When a player comes to a circular spot, he stops on it and answers the Continental Question (CQ) before moving on. If he answers correctly, the player receives a Continental Collectables Card and continues as usual. If he answers incorrectly, the player uses consecutive turns to answer the question with a different question for every try.

✓ A player wins the game by being the first to reach the igloo with all seven Continental Collectables Cards.
